# RURAL ALASKA HONORS INSTITUTE SELECTS SUMMER STUDENTS

Forty four college-bound rural Alaska high school students are slated to attend the fifth Rural Alaska Honors Institute, to be held June 29 through August 7 on the University of Alaska Fairbanks Campus. The six week intensive academic program for rural students between their junior and senior years in high school is an early introduction to college. The program is sponsored by UAF. Students who attend are chosen competitively based primarily upon their academic acheivement in home schools.

This year a special RAHI Selection Committee chose from among 85 applicants. The overall goal of RAHI according to program director Jim Kowalsky is "to promote academic success in college." The program was started principally by UAF Chancellor Patrick O'Rourke and UAF Alaska Native Programs Director Dennis Demmert. A request made in 1982 to O'Rourke and others, to devise a student development program to help stem the high college dropout rate by rural Native students, was made by then AFN leadership, including Willie Hensley, John Sackett, Sam Kito and Frank Perguson among others.

The RAHI program features intensive six weeks of instruction to sharpen, and to further build, academic skills of participating students according to Mr. Kowalsky. Required courses taken by all RAHI participants include Math, Writing for College, Public Speaking, ANCSA, Library Skills, College Learning Skills, Team Research Project, College Knowledge (a campus survival course), and Physical Education (beginning swimming instruction).

In addition to the core of required courses, RAHI students each select a career-oriented "college elective" course from these: Education, Introduction to Business Administration, Natural Science, Engineering, and Earth Science. Core courses are taught by visiting instructors from school districts and UAF staff, and the electives are taught by UAF professors. Courses are taught in small classes, and instructors also tutor students individually during evening study halls.

The RAHI motto, "Challenge Yourself," is well earned according to Mr. Kowalsky. "We work them to their limits in the course work here," he said, "but our students also greatly enjoy the special recreational activities we sponsor for them, and they grow to value the closeness and sharing of many wonderful new friends they make at RAHI among other students and staff," he said. "In fact, when it's time to leave for home at the end of the program most students are reluctant to say good bye," he noted. (MCRE)

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A full time staff of professionals and UAF undergraduates lives in and supervises the dormitory where all RAHI students live during the program. This staff also plans and operates the special RAHI recreation program.

"We try to give RAHI students an early exposure to college and to the types of learning and the demands that will be placed upon them when they're here as actual college students so that they will know exactly what to expect," Kowalsky said, "and not go into shock when they see how different school is on an urban campus from what they are used to at home." He said RAHI also tracks students who enroll at UAF. " We do see some significant progress," he said.



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




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## RAHI Experience



## Grading Policy

Since R.A.H.I. courses do not carry credit either at the University or in the home school, they represent a middle ground between high school and college. We want students to work as hard as they can and to continue trying to improve their performance. We do not want to discourage any student who has voluntarily assumed this extra work load in an effort to prepare for college. We do want them to realize that college may require efforts beyond what they may have previously experienced.

Thus, instructors are asked to grade on two levels, an objective numerical scale (0-100) and an effort grade (satisfactory) outstanding unsatisfactory).

On the numerical scale, instructors are asked to grade honestly and even rigorously, reflecting a percentage of possible correct answers. We request that you do not translate this percentage into a letter grade, though you may need to give your students some idea of what the numerical scores would mean if they were college grades.

The satisfactory/unsatisfactory determination will not be based solely on the numerical scores. The criteria to be considered are performance, compliance, doing the required work, and basically participating in the academic program you have structured.

Students who earn an "unsatisfactory" rating in one or more classes will not graduate from the program.

Students who pass all their classes and receive a recommendation for Early Acceptance to UAF will graduate with honors. A G.P.A. norm of 85% and special achievement in the criteria areas of performance, compliance, and participation will be considered in making this recommendation.


At the conclusion of classes and final exams, the staff will evaluate each student's performance with reference to college readiness. Those students whose work this Summer and whose prior record of tests and grades indicate an excellent chance of college success will be referred to Chancellor O'Rourke and the Office of Admissions for early acceptance to UAF for the following Fall. Please note that except in rare instances we will not encourage students to graduate from high school early.

During the final week of the program, individual counseling sessions will be arranged with each student to review his/her performance in high school and during the summer program. Recommendations for a senior year program of preparation for college will be made at that time.

To facilitate these evaluations, photocopies of all work which receives a grade should be maintained in the central file for each student.


I agree to make participation in RAHI my first priority for the time I am enrolled. and to abide by University regulations and all rules of the Rural Alaska Honors Institute. including the following:


- The use or possession of any alcoholic beverages and illegal drugs including marijuana are strictly prohibited, and will result in immediate expulsion.

- 6. Students will abide by dormitory rules established by the staff and the dorm council regarding curfews and curet hours.



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



